British Values Statement

The Department for Education has introduced a statutory duty for schools to promote British Values more actively from September 2014, and to ensure they are taught in schools.

At Wodensfield Primary School we take seriously our responsibility to prepare children for life in modern Britain. We value the ethnic backgrounds of all our pupils and families and undertake a variety of events and lessons to celebrate and explore these alongside other cultures in our country.

We ensure that fundamental British Values are introduced, discussed and lived out through the ethos and work of our school. All aspects of the curriculum provide a vehicle for furthering understanding of these concepts. Our broad and balanced curriculum provides excellent opportunities to deepen and develop understanding. The spiritual, moral, social and cultural education of our children forms an integral part of the curriculum at Wodensfield.

The school makes considerable efforts to ensure children have exposure to a wealth of experiences beyond their local community, during which these concepts are reinforced, through for example, sporting events, a range of visits and residential visits for years two and six. Their strong rooted values-based understanding equips them with an excellent platform for embracing difference. "Treat others as we want to be treated ourselves" is a core value.

At Wodensfield we expect all our children to be good role models for each other. The expectation that we should be Ready, Respectful and Safe is evident in all aspects of school life.
